The Forum sponsors the National Legislative Seminar at the Holiday Inn Crystal City in Arlington, Virginia on March 15–18, 2020. Other opportunities include practicing advocacy skills, attending legislative briefings, and networking with DKG members.

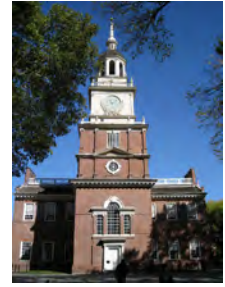
Keeping up the Momentum with New Members

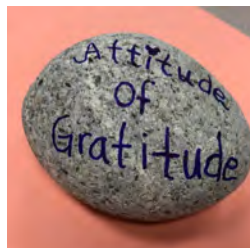
